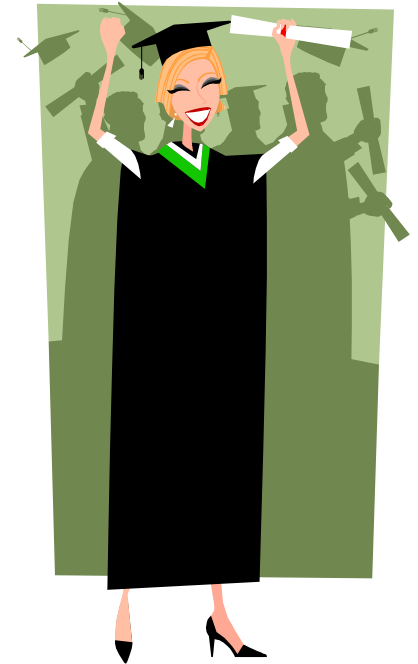

The Challenge Program requires both independent study and computer skills.

Challenge Program Overview

The Robertson County Challenge Program is designed to assist students who are in danger of discontinuing their education because they are behind in their required number of credits to graduate. Challenge students are able to receive a regular high school diploma by meeting the minimum credit requirements as outlined by the State's Board of Education and the Department of Education.

Grading Policy

Students work independently on a server-based learning software. Grades are determined as follows:

Coursework = 60%

Assessment = 20%

Notes = 20%

Attendance/Discipline Policy

Challenge Program students must abide by the same attendance and disciplinary policies as all other Robertson County students.

How Do I Apply?

Application to the Challenge Program is made through your school's guidance counselor. Your transcript is evaluated to determine what courses you will need from Challenge to complete the course of study.

All Challenge Program completers will be eligible to participate in the County's Winter Graduation Exercise held in January. CP students' caps and gowns are their school colors. NOTE: Once a student is enrolled in the Challenge Program, he/she cannot return to a school in Robertson County. Students must be able to provide their own transportation to/from the Challenge Program.
